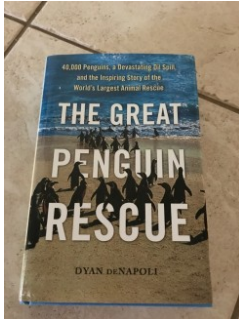
Why do our partners step in to raise chicks instead of leaving them in their natural habitat? It's not because African penguins are bad parents—they aren't.

Not So Fun African Penguin Fact

The 25th anniversary of the Treasure Oil Spill is coming up in June. Still the largest animal rescue in history, 25,000 people went to South Africa to help. 19,000 oiled birds, another 19,500 unoiled penguins were moved out of the path of the rapidly approaching oil slick. Dyan deNapoli, also known as the "The Penguin Lady," wrote *The Great Penguin Rescue*, about the incredible rescue effort. There are now fewer African penguins in the wild than the number of birds rescued 25 years ago.
